1.	Accepting a Friendly Stranger This test demonstrates that the dog will allow a friendly stranger to approach it and speak to the handler in a natural, everyday situation. The evaluator and the handler shake hands and exchange pleasantries. The dog must show no sign of resentment or shyness and must not break position or try to go to the evaluator.	<input type="checkbox"/>	<input type="checkbox"/>
2.	Sitting Politely for Petting This test demonstrates that the dog will allow a friendly stranger to touch it while it is out with its handler. The evaluator pets the dog and then circles the dog and handler. The dog must not show shyness or resentment.	<input type="checkbox"/>	<input type="checkbox"/>
3.	Appearance and Grooming This practical test demonstrates that the dog will welcome being groomed and examined and will permit a stranger to do so. It also demonstrates the owner's care, concern and responsibility. The evaluator inspects the dog, combs or brushes the dog and lightly examines the ears and each front foot.	<input type="checkbox"/>	<input type="checkbox"/>
4.	Out for Walk (Walking on a loose leash) This test demonstrates that the handler is in control of the dog. The evaluator may use a pre-plotted course or may direct the handler / dog team by issuing instructions or commands. There must be a left turn, a right turn and an about turn with at least one stop in between and another at the end. The dog need not be perfectly aligned with the handler and need not sit when the handler stops.	<input type="checkbox"/>	<input type="checkbox"/>
5.	Walking Though a Crowd This test demonstrates that the dog can move about politely in pedestrian traffic and is under control in public places. The dog and handler walk around and pass close to several people. The dog may show some interest in the strangers but must not strain at the lead.	<input type="checkbox"/>	<input type="checkbox"/>

6.	<p>Sit and Down on Command / Staying in Place</p> <p>This test demonstrates that the dog has training, will respond to the handler's command to sit and down and will remain in the place commanded by the handler (sit or down position, whichever the handler prefers). The handler may take a reasonable amount of time and use more than one command. The handler must leave the dog at a distance of at least 6 feet and perform some task (such as pick up the dog's poop). The dog should stay in place but may change position, until the handler returns.</p>	<input type="checkbox"/>	<input type="checkbox"/>
7.	<p>Coming when Called</p> <p>This test demonstrates that the dog will come when called by the handler. The handler will walk 10ft. from the dog, turn to face the dog, and will call the dog. The handler may use body language and encouragement to get the dog to come. Handlers may choose to tell the dog to "stay" or "wait" or they may simply walk away, giving no instructions to the dog as the evaluator provides mild distractions (e.g. petting).</p>	<input type="checkbox"/>	<input type="checkbox"/>
8.	<p>Reaction to Another Dog</p> <p>This test demonstrates that the dog can behave politely around other dogs. Two handlers and their dogs approach each other from a distance of about 20 feet, stop, shake hands and exchange pleasantries and continue on for about 10feet. The dogs should show no more than casual interest in each other.</p>	<input type="checkbox"/>	<input type="checkbox"/>
9.	<p>Reactions to Distractions</p> <p>This test demonstrates that the dog is confident at all times when faced with common distracting situations. The dog may express a natural interest and curiosity and may appear slightly startled but should not panic, try to run away, show aggressiveness or bark.</p>	<input type="checkbox"/>	<input type="checkbox"/>
10.	<p>Supervised Separation</p> <p>This test demonstrates that a dog can be left alone, if necessary, and will maintain its training and good manners. Evaluators are encouraged to say something like "Would you like me to watch your dog?" and a person will hold the leash of the dog. The dog will be held for three minutes while the handler is out of sight. The dog does not have to stay in position but should not continually bark, whine, howl, pace unnecessarily or show anything other than mild agitation or nervousness.</p>	<input type="checkbox"/>	<input type="checkbox"/>
